1. INTRODUCTION

Extended abstracts to be submitted to the 11th Australasian Natural Convection Workshop are required to be formatted in accordance with this template. All extended abstracts should include an **INTRODUCTION**, providing a statement of the problem.

The language of the Workshop is English; extended abstracts should be prepared in English and adhere to Australian English spelling wherever possible.

The **INTRODUCTION** may also contain a brief summary of relevant literature with references to published works [1–3]. All cited references should be listed at the end of the extended abstract in the order of occurrence and are formatted as shown by the examples in this template. Among the listed references, [1] is a journal article, [2] is a thesis, [3] is a paper from a conference Proceedings, [4] is a chapter from a book, and [5] is a book. Journal titles, conference names and book names should be italicised and should not be abbreviated.

2. FORMATTING REQUIREMENTS

The main body of the extended abstract may contain one or more Sections with properly numbered headings such as ‘**2. APPROACH**’ and ‘**3. RESULTS**’. Avoid sub-sections.

Extended abstracts including references should not exceed two full A4 pages.




Figure 1. This figure and its caption are centred.

3. FIGURES AND TABLES

Authors are encouraged to include one or more figures or tables to illustrate major results. Figures and tables are centred in the column of text, and the width of the figures and tables should not exceed the width of the text column. Text in tables and figures should be no smaller than font size 10. Figures and tables must be sequentially numbered and labelled. Colours may be used in both figures and tables.

4. CONCLUSIONS

The conclusions section should contain a brief summary of major findings.
